The Sainik Schools Admission 2026 process will officially commence online through the All India Sainik Schools Entrance Examination (AISSEE) portal in October/November 2025, and the last date to submit forms is November 2025. The entrance examination is scheduled for the second week of January 2026, and admit cards will be released in January 2026. Selection will follow e-counselling, medical checks, and document verification.

This article will provide you with everything you need to know about the admission process, eligibility, important dates, exam details, and all the latest updates for Sainik School Admission 2026.

To appear for the **All India Sainik Schools Entrance Examination (AISSEE) 2026**, candidates must meet the following eligibility requirements-

For Class 6 Admission:

- Candidates should be between 13 to 15 years of age as on 31

- Candidates must have passed Class 8 from a recognized school at the time of admission

The application for AISSEE 2026 will be available online through the official NTA website. Students must complete the process carefully to avoid rejection. Here's how to apply:

Step 1: Visit the official website of All India Sainik School Entrance Examination.

Step 2: Register as a new user by entering your basic details such as name, date of birth, email ID, and mobile number.

Step 3: Fill in the application form with your personal information, academic details, and choice of school(s).

Step 4: Upload the required documents in the correct format and size

- Passport-size photograph
- Signature
- Left-hand thumb impression
- Domicile certificate
- Date of birth certificate
- Category/service certificate (if applicable)

Step 5: Pay the application fee online:

- ₹800 for General/OBC/Defence category
- ₹650 for SC/ST category (The fee may change based on the official notification)

Step 6: Review all details before submitting the form. Use the correction window (if available) to make changes.

Step 7: Submit the form and download/print the confirmation page for future reference.

- Understand the syllabus and exam pattern thoroughly.
- Focus on Mathematics and English as they carry higher marks.
- Revise NCERT books for Science and Social Science.
- Practice reasoning and GK daily.
- Solve mock tests and previous year papers under timed conditions.
- Make a study timetable with daily targets and regular revision.
- Improve health and fitness for the medical test.
- Stay consistent with preparation and focus on weak areas.

After the examination, the National Testing Agency (NTA) releases the provisional answer key on the AISSEE portal, usually in February 2026. This answer key allows candidates to compare their responses with the official solutions and estimate their scores before the results are declared.

- Provisional answer key: Released first, open to feedback.
- Challenge window: Candidates can raise objections to specific questions/answers by paying a small processing fee. These objections are reviewed by experts.
- Final answer key: Published after evaluation of challenges. The result is prepared strictly based on this final key.

Having access to the answer key gives students transparency in the evaluation process and helps them understand where they performed well or made mistakes.

The AISSEE 2026 results are expected in March 2026 and will be available online on the NTA website. Candidates must log in using their application number and password/date of birth to download their scorecards. The result will display:

- Candidate's personal details
- Section-wise scores
- Total marks obtained
- Qualification status (whether eligible for the next round)

In addition to the scorecard, NTA will also publish the merit list school-wise, category-wise, and class-wise. Shortlisted candidates will be called for the medical examination. Students and parents should regularly check the portal for updates to ensure they do not miss any important step after results.

Admission to Sainik Schools is mainly based on performance in t

Admission to Sainik Schools is mainly based on performance in the All India Sainik Schools Entrance Examination (AISSEE), conducted by the National Testing Agency (NTA).

For traditional Sainik Schools: Candidates who qualify in AISSEE are invited for a medical examination. The final merit list is prepared by considering both the written exam scores and medical fitness.

For New Sainik Schools (NSS) the admission process follows two routes:

- 40% Route (Category A): At least 40% of seats are reserved for candidates who appear in AISSEE, qualify in the exam, and opt for admission to New Sainik Schools through the NTA merit list.
- 60% Route (Category B): Up to 60% of seats are reserved for students already studying in the same school. These students are admitted based on a qualifying test conducted either by NTA or another approved testing body, as prescribed by the Sainik Schools Society.

If seats under Category B remain vacant, they will be filled by candidates from Category A who have qualified in AISSEE.

After the results and medical examination, candidates who qualify must participate in the online e-counselling process. This stage is crucial, as it decides which Sainik School a student will be allotted.

- Choice filling: Candidates are required to log in to the e-counselling portal and select their preferred Sainik Schools in order of priority.
- Seat allocation: Based on the candidate's rank, category, reservation rules, and available seats, the system allots a school.

- Document verification: Candidates must upload and present their documents (such as domicile certificate, birth certificate, category certificate, etc.) during counselling.
- Reporting: After confirmation, students must report to the allotted Sainik School within the given timeframe.

Seat allotment is carried out through the centralized e-counselling system. It ensures transparency and fairness in the admission process. The seat distribution depends on:

- Performance in AISSEE
- Category-based reservations (SC, ST, OBC-NCL, Defence, Girls, etc.)
- Domicile quota (Home State/Other State)

For traditional Sainik Schools:

- 67% seats are reserved for students from the state/UT where the school is located.
- 33% are open to students from other states/UTs.
- Within these quotas, specific percentages are reserved for SC, ST, OBC-NCL, Defence personnel wards, and girls.

For New Sainik Schools:

Seat allotment depends on the 40% AISSEE merit route and the 60% internal school route, as explained earlier.

Sainik School admissions follow a well-defined reservation system to ensure fair opportunities for candidates from different states, categories, and backgrounds. Seats are distributed based on state quota as well as category quota, with additional reservations for defence personnel wards and girl students.

Identity proof – School ID card or PAN Card or Aadhaar Number or Passport Number, or any other Photo Identity Card issued by the Government.

Passport-size photograph (size: 10kb to 200kb) in JPG format.

- The photographs must be taken on or after 1st July 2025, preferably indicating clearly the name of the candidate along with the date of taking the photograph.
- Photographs should not be with a cap or goggles. The focus needs to be on the face (80% face coverage, ears clearly visible, on a white background)
- Spectacles are allowed only if being used regularly.
- Polaroid and Computer-generated photos are not acceptable.
- Applications not complying with these instructions or with unclear photographs are liable to be rejected.
- The photographs need not be attested. Candidates are advised to keep 6 to 8 passport-sized and colour photographs with a white background.

Candidate's signature

- The candidate should put his/her full signature in running handwriting, not in capital letters, on white paper with Black Ink pen and scan for uploading.
- File size must be between 4kb to 30kb in JPG format.
- Online Application Forms without uploaded signatures will be rejected.
- In case someone else's signature has been uploaded, the candidature shall be cancelled, and the case will be considered as

using UFM. Criminal action, as per the laws of the country, shall also be initiated.

Candidate's left-hand thumb impression

- A candidate should affix his/her left-hand thumb impression on white paper with blue ink and scan for uploading.
- File size must be between 10kb and 50kb in JPG format.
- Unclear left-hand thumb impression in online application forms will be rejected.

Domicile certificate

- File size must be between 50kb to 300kb in PDF format.
- If the domicile certificate of the candidate is not available, the domicile certificate of the parent may be uploaded in the relevant field. Proof of domicile of successful candidates is to be furnished during admission.

Category certificate or service certificate (if applicable)

• File size must be between 50kb to 300kb in PDF format.
